## Giant green turtle found dead on Labuan beach

**LABUAN:** A giant green sea turtle was found dead without its head and tail at Layang-Layangan beach, here, on Monday.

The 1.16-metre female from the most endangered and threatened species of sea turtle was found by a villager and children who were playing on the beach around 9 am.

The discovery was reported to Bernama journalist Jailani Hasan who then notified the Fisheries Department at 10.24 am.

The department's marine park and resource management branch head, Vanessa Caroline Lee who arrived at the scene said this was the second discovery after a hawksbill turtle (*Eretmochelys imbricata*) was found dead on Chimney beach on Sept 6.

"This is the largest turtle we've ever found washed ashore here.

We will make a police report for a thorough investigation to be conducted as we are concerned about possible human wrongdoings that led to the death of the turtles.

She said once the investigation paper was opened, she would

urge members of the public and fishermen to channel the related information to her department.

The creature's body and flippers were intact, according to Bernama photographer Muqtadir Halim.

"I was very alarmed and sad

to see such a graceful and rare creature lying dead on our shores...it could probably have been struck by a ship in the waters or killed by humans," he said.

The last time a dead green turtle was found was on Feb 9,

2019 on Pohon Batu beach, next to Layang-Layangan beach.

Classified as endangered, green turtles are threatened by over-harvesting of their eggs, hunting of the adults, being caught in fishing nets and loss of nesting beach sites. — Bernama

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# Hasil laut Pulau Pinang dicuri

Maritim Malaysia usir 44 bot nelayan asing dalam tempoh enam bulan pertama tahun ini



**KEKAYAAN** hasil laut Pulau Pinang yang terkenal dengan pelbagai jenis ikan seperti: seranagin, kembong, tenggiri, tongkol dan bawal menarik minat nelayan nelayan dari Indonesia untuk mencubalah sempadan negara semata-mata untuk mencuri hasil negeri itu. Pencubahan itu membabitkan kawasan di dalam perairan negeri dan kawasan pertindihan sempadan Malaysia-Indonesia atau Unresolved Maritime Boundary. Nelayan berkenaan kebanyakannya dikesan berasal dari Belawan, Medan dan Aceh di Indonesia yang terletak berdekatan dengan kawasan perairan negeri ini.

Perairan Pulau Pinang jadi lubuk nelayan Indonesia tangkap pelbagai jenis ikan

## Ceroboh sebelum kebas hasil laut

**GEORGE TOWN** – Perairan Pulau Pinang yang terkenal dengan hasil laut termasuk kepelbagaian jenis ikan kini menjadi 'lubuk' kepada kumpulan nelayan dari Indonesia untuk mengaut keuntungan secara haram.

Tidak hanya berari mencerooboh sempadan negara, kumpulan nelayan ini yang dipercayai dari Belawan, Medan dan Aceh turut menangkap hasil laut yang terdapat perairan negara, sekali gus memberi kesan kepada hasil pendapatan nelayan tempatan.

Difahamkan, selain kaya dengan hasil laut seperti ikan semangin, kembong, tenggiri, tongkol dan bawal, perairan Pulau Pinang yang berdekatan dengan negara jiran turut menjadi faktor kawasan itu kerap dicerooboh nelayan asing. Pengarah Maritim Malaysia (APMM) negeri, Kapten Maritim Abd. Razak Mohamed berkata, hasil maklumat yang diterima, penceroobohan biasanya berlaku membabitkan kawasan di dalam perairan negeri dan kawasan pertindihan sempadan Malaysia-Indonesia atau Unresolved Maritime Boundary.

Katanya, biarpun menyedari

risiko ditahan pihak berkuasa negara ini yang melakukan rondaan 24 jam sehari, namun nelayan dari

negara jiran itu sanggup mengambili risiko demi membawa pulang hasil laut ke negara mereka.

"Mereka akan meninjau kapal penguatkuasa APMM sebelum merentasi sempadan perairan, sekiranya diuji ada yang masih degil untuk masuk semula sejurus kapal APMM beredar."

"Justeru, kita akan terus berada di situ bagi mengesan mereka mencerooboh," katanya kepada Kosmo! baru-baru ini.

Tambah Abd. Razak, nelayan asing ini juga akan membocorkan bot mereka dan berpura-pura mengalami kerosakan sekiranya ditangkap atau memberi alasan

cuba berlindung dari laut bergelora akibat ribut dalam usaha melepaskan diri.

Jelasnya lagi, setakat bulan Jun tahun ini, sebanyak 44 bot nelayan asing daripada 68 bot yang dibesat telah diuji kerana memasuki kawasan Unresolved Maritime Boundary, manakala tiga bot dan 15 nelayan ditahan selepas diadapati memasuki perairan negara.

"Angka itu meningkat beberapa kali ganda berbanding beberapa bot daripada 34 bot yang dikesan telah diuji pihaknya sepanjang tahun lalu."

"Dalam tempoh itu, kita men-

yita hasil laut bernilai RM12,200 berbanding RM3,597 pada tahun lalu, bahkan jumlah sebenar yang dicuri dianggarkan lebih banyak.

"Nelayan asing ini tertarik dengan perairan Pulau Pinang kerana kaya dengan hasil laut seperti ikan semangin, kembong, tenggiri, tongkol dan bawal."

"Perairan Pulau Pinang juga dijaga dengan baik oleh agensi berkaitan seperti Jabatan Perikanan. Selain itu, perairan negeri ini juga mempunyai banyak cukai tiruan di perairan Pulau Rimau ke Pulau Kandi sehinggalah ke sempadan," katanya.

Abd. Razak berkata, pihaknya akan terus mengawal keselamatan di perairan negeri ini yang berkecuaan kira-kira 14,071.6 kilometer persegi dan panjang pantai 359 kilometer daripada ancaman bot nelayan asing.

"APMM Pulau Pinang mempunyai aset sebanyak tujuh buah bot dan tiga kapal, selain rondaan harian helikopter dan pesawat maritim dari Stesen Udara Maritim Subang (SUMS)."

"Dengan kekuatan kira-kira 150 keanggotaan di negeri ini, APMM Pulau Pinang akan terus berkuatkuasa 24 jam sehari bagi memastikan perairan negara sentiasa selamat daripada ancaman," katanya lagi.

## Pemancing sering terserempak nelayan asing curi ikan

**GEORGE TOWN** – Kumpulan pemancing di negeri ini mendakwa sering terserempak dengan nelayan dari Indonesia yang mencerooboh perairan negeri ini bagi menangkap ikan.

Pengerusi Persatuan Nelayan Pulau Pinang Selatan, Arshad Omar berkata, kehadiran nelayan

asing berkenaan bagaimanapun tidak begitu menjejaskan nelayan tempatan kerana lokasi mereka yang begitu jauh dari kawasan menangkap ikan.

Menurutnya, nelayan asing terbahit didapati hanya mencerooboh di kawasan berjarak lebih 50 batu nautika dari perei-

ran negara.

"Mereka biasanya datang secara berkumpulan lalu antara empat ke lima buah bot dan hanya menggunakan pusat rawa untuk menangkap ikan."

"Hanya pemancing yang sering terserempak dengan mereka kerana kawasan berkenaan

lebih kepada menjadi lubuk pemancing dan jauh dari kawasan nelayan mencari ikan," katanya kepada Kosmo!

Arshad berkata, pihaknya mendapati nelayan asing berkenaan tidak mengganggu pemancing tempatan ketika mencerooboh.

"Mereka akan terkejut apabila terserempak pemancing, namun selepas menyedari kami bukan pihak berkuasa mereka teruskan aktiviti menangkap ikan."

"Kebiasannya nelayan ini akan berada di laut antara dua ke tiga hari sebelum pulang," katanya.
