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## Malaysia to play it safe

## Imported Japanese food to be closely monitored

PUTRAJAYA: Close monitoring will be carried out on food items imported from Japan to ensure their safety, says acting Domestic Trade and Cost of Living Minister Dank Armiran Mark Ali

Japan had announced that it would start releasing more than one million metric tonnes of treated water from the wrecked

rikushima Daiichi nuclear power plant In 2011, a 9.0-magnirude earthquake triggered a tsunami that hit three reactors at the nuclear power plant, located about 250km north of Tokyo.

The tragedy was the second-worst nuclear accident after the Ukraine's Chernobyl disaster in 1986.

Yesterday, MOH special adviser Kelvin Yii said safety measures to screen radioac-tive elements in food imported from Japan

would be similar to those done in 2011.

He assured Malaysians that the ministry and other related authorities, including the Agriculture and Food Security Ministry, are taking stringent measures to ensure the

"Food safety is not something that will be compromised. Through MOH, high risk food imports from Japan will be subject to Level 4 (surveillance) examination to screen for radioactive elements as the island nation moves to release water from island nation moves to release water from its troubled Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant," he said This was something that MOH, through

the ministry's Food Safety and Quality Division, had done to monitor the risks, Yii

added in a statement.

For instance, he said there was monitoring of Japanese food imports from May 2011 to April 2012 following the Fukushima nuclear plant meltdown Yii also said samples were collected and

analysed to ensure adherence to the regulatory limits under Regulation 37 of the Food Regulations 1985.

"I understand some of the anxieties at even concerns raised by the public. That why, in order to address this concern, the ministry is committed to constantly mor toring national entry points and local ma kets to ensure food safety is guaranteed he added

As such, he said the ministries involve including MOH, were on high alert ensure food supplied to Malaysia was sa for consumption

On Wednesday, Deputy Agriculture at Food Security Minister Chan Foong H said in a statement that there is current no live marine fish imported from Japa

citing the Fisheries Department.
"For any non-live fishery products from Japan, the ministry is working closely wi the Health Ministry and other releval authorities such as the Quarantine ar Inspection Services Malaysia (MAQIS) ar Malaysia Fisheries Developme Authority (LKIM) to monitor food safe issues, including checks on health certific tions and radiation during post-import," h
